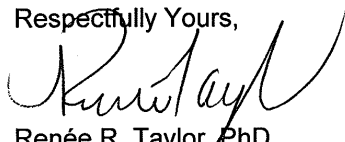
Re: Visiting Professor Dr. Andrzej Gryglewicz

To Whom it May Concern:

It is with great pleasure that I write this letter of gratitude and reflection about the recent visit from Dr. Andrzej Gryglewicz to the Department of Occupational Therapy at the University of Illinois at Chicago. Our faculty and practicing occupational therapists from the University of Illinois Medical center and its affiliated institutions benefitted from an enriching exchange with Dr. Gryglewicz during his visit. Among other topics, we discussed educational practices, learning theories, and similarities and differences between the U.S. and Polish approaches to the rehabilitation of children and adults with a wide range of cognitive, psychological, and motor impairments. Dr. Gryglewicz observed a wide range of courses within the curriculum of our entry level Masters of Science for Certification in Occupational Therapy Program. Additionally, he observed many clinical practice settings, ranging from early intervention and pediatrics home therapy, to neonatal intensive care, to adult acute care, to adult outpatient, to hand therapy, to nursing home and geriatric care.

We discussed a number of possibilities for future educational collaboration with Dr. Gryglewicz, including an ongoing applied clinical research exchange with Kielhofner's Model of Human Occupation (MOHO) Clearinghouse and with Taylor's Center for Intentional Relationships. Both centers offer clinical assessment and intervention tools designed to facilitate and guide therapeutic reasoning according to a client-centered, occupation-focused practice approach. Resources provided by the MOHO Clearinghouse promote students' understanding of how occupations are motivated, patterned, and performed in specific social and physical contexts. Resources available through the Center for Intentional Relationships offer a guide to managing the interpersonal aspects of the client-therapist relationship in rehabilitation. Additionally, our department values opportunities for students to receive fieldwork training at approved international placements, and we would very much appreciate any such opportunities for our students in Poland, particularly if Polish-speaking.

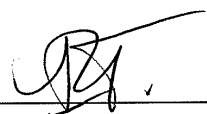

participated in an individualized program including mentoring and consultation regarding the future development of an entry-level occupational therapy (OT) curriculum at his university in Warsaw, Poland. He participated in the following coordinated activities across the following categories during his visit on our campus, October 4-18, 2011:

- Discussions with chairs regarding curriculums at three very different universities in terms of size, faculty performance expectations and department outcomes balanced differently across teaching, research and service expectations: Duquesne University, University of Pittsburgh, & Chatham University.
- Individual meetings with all OT faculty and faculty affiliates at Duquesne (to discuss teaching & research) and he attended several in class observations.
- Day-long tour of several fieldwork education sites for students to see practice as well as learn about clinical training of students including fieldwork program development by our fieldwork coordinator.
- Overview of resources that support our program in the areas of technology, recruiting and advising including meeting with the Dean of the Rangos School at Duquesne.
- Tours of state-of-the-art research facilities related to clavicle/shoulder motion research, speech-language pathology, wheeled mobility & seating, robotics, motion analysis, environmental controls, and assistive technology related to disabilities.
- Consultation with the National Board for Certification in Occupational Therapy regarding international certification issues.
- Overview of the American Occupational Therapy Association resources and programs for professional development and policy-making in occupational therapy.
- Meetings with DU student organization leaders: Student Occupational Therapy Association and Pi Theta Epsilon OT honor society.
- Complementary attendance at the Ohio State Occupational therapy association's annual conference to learn about practice and research.

- Meeting with a DU faculty member who is Honorary Consul of the Republic of Poland and a local occupational therapy practitioner who is Polish, has her doctorate and desires to do OT research with this emerging academic program.

Dr. Gryglewicz was introduced to OT education and professional leaders to facilitate future communication. He was given access to and provided with extensive curriculum materials from our program. In addition, he received resources that are considered major professional documents in our profession that guide the development of and outcomes from occupational therapy curriculums.

In addition, he presented two lectures: an overview of this research and the other, regarding healthcare, and OT in Poland.

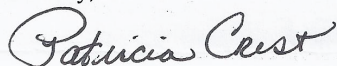
A conservative estimate is that he engaged in no less than sixty (60) hours of formal programming to complete all mentoring activities across thirteen days (13), not including social events. I hope this program was successful both in providing information useful for future planning as I coordinated a schedule that provided details in program development and a broad overview of systems that facilitate/direct our curriculum perspectives.

In the future, I welcome opportunities to assist with the continuing development of the occupational therapy program at Pilsudski University as well as considering collaborative research activities as deemed appropriate by both parties. I look forward to future proposals and collaboration including a return trip with Dr. Gryglewicz at any time!

If additional information regarding his scholarly visit is requested, I will provide upon request.

In closing, I want to acknowledge Dr. Gryglewicz as an exemplary ambassador for Poland, his University and for the future of occupational therapy in his country. He is knowledgeable, inquisitive, reflective, enthusiastic and respectful. He is serious about the task ahead and has an engaging approach that is analytic and collaborative. I am highly honored that he chose our University for his study and consultation and welcome future contact as his program evolves. I value what he is setting-out to do, both for Poland as well as our profession.
